The Power and Purpose of Liturgical Dance

Sacred dance is a powerful, passionate and transformative form of worship. Its interpretation, when shared in community, creates opportunities for spiritual renewal to manifest in others. However, dancers must have an ongoing and personal engagement with the Divine to explore theological themes such as faith, reconciliation, love, forgiveness, etc., in order for their dance to be transformative. Instilling spiritual practices, discipline, and understanding of one's purpose and calling in life helps this process of transformation. This workshop is designed for dancers who desire to take their ministry "to another level" and it is hoped that participants will fulfill the following learning objectives: 1. Explore the theological implications of liturgical dance. 2. Examine the purpose(s) of liturgical dance for the church. 3. Examine the calling and ministry of liturgical dance. 4. Discover how spiritual practices such as prayer, fasting, studying, etc. create pathways of best practices for discipleship and spiritual formation for the dancer.
